SENIOR YEAR CURRICULUM

IN SENIOR YEAR MODERN LITERATURE (SEMESTER 1) our students will read and discuss:

- selected poems from Hardy, Houseman, Yeats, Auden, Frost, Eliot, Bishop et al.
- classic novels such as Crime and Punishments and The Picture of Dorian Gray
- short stories by Wilde, Chekov, Poe, Hawthorn, and Robert louis Stevenson
- Hamlet by William Shakespeare

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IN SENIOR YEAR SENIOR THESIS (SEMESTER 2) our students will:

- reflect on the wisdom and practice the skills their Classical education has fostered
- wrestle with real world problems concerning human nature
 - craft and support a thesis involving the "great conversation of great ideas"
- develop their reading list from the greatest works of literature they've not yet read

IN SENIOR YEAR MODERN WORLD HISTORY our students will:

- study the major events of world history from 1815-1953
- understand the ramifications of the French Revolution, industrialization, and nationalism
- explore various totalitarian ideologies from 1919 to the present day
- read and discuss accounts of the World Wars, the Cold War, and conflicts in the Middle East

IN SENIOR YEAR AMERICAN GOVERNMENT & POLITICS our students will:

- read and study major speeches and essays in the history of American political thought
- understand the moral vision of the American Founding and the purposes of the Constitution
- recognize the way Progressives have transformed the constitutional order
- read selections from Democracy in America by Alexis de Tocqueville

IN SENIOR YEAR CALCULUS (OR AP CALCULUS AB) our students will study:

- the derivative function and the differentiation of monomials and ploynomials
- the calculus method of finding roots
- geometrical and analytical treatment of maxima and minima
- logarithmic and exponential functions and their applications

IN JUNIOR YEAR FOREIGN LANGUAGE our students will:

- continue to study either French or Spanish at the intermediate level
- learn proper pronunciation and accent of vowel and consonant sounds
- continue to build a vocabulary of everyday words and conversational phrases
- regularly engage in conversational dialogues

IN SENIOR YEAR SCIENCE our students will choose one or two of the following courses:

- Astronomy
- AP Biology
- AP Chemistry
- AP Physics I
